## Flower Design Classes

As some of you may know, I created a micro flower farm where I grow flowers that are traditionally difficult to ship, such as heirloom fragrant narcissus, trumpet and parrot tulips, dahlias, cosmos, specialty sunflowers, irises, ranunculus, anemones, peonies, lilies, zinnias, herbs and more. Our blooms are grown sustainably, seasonally, and with nature and



and pollinators in mind. One of the reasons I started growing flowers was seeing the necessity of a healthy environment for pollinators (and to grow more food for us). It started as a desire to get more of a crop from our veggies by interplanting flowers in our vegetable garden, and soon the blooms took over. The gardens (there are 2) are full of bees, moths, worms, birds, and the sounds of life. I aim to foster healthy plants by focusing on the soil

health, using compost, beneficial insects when needed to keep pests at bay, as well as planting natives. No pesticides or herbicides are ever used, but rather I seek organic ways to work with nature to create a biodiverse, thriving garden. Everything is grown from seed or bulb, and harvest everything by hand, including hundreds of dahlia tubers. I offer bouquets to our customers, as well as a Spring, Summer and Dahlia subscription CSA (Community Supported Agriculture). Recently, I paired up with two other local flower farmers to offer flowers at the Fair Haven Farmers Market; we are named "Crabapple Flower Collective", after the apple farms that once were in our area. Our little farm is growing, and on the daily I feel more and more connected to God's creation, simply by planting a seed and watching it grow, tending to it. It's a source of calm and awe.

I'll be bringing flower design classes to Wilson Hall starting sometime this spring. These will be ticketed events, in order to pay for the blooms and vases offered, and part of the proceeds will go as a donation to the church. I'll keep you posted as we schedule dates. Looking forward to sharing these blooms with you!
